Trevor & Rebecca Bell: The Bells' team looks to start construction on a medical office building this month as they continue to seek increased openings for gospel work after Ramadan in nearby villages. They are praying for wisdom on ministry direction as there are multiple pathways into the local cultures.

Diego and Gladys Campelo: The Campelos crossed the Mediterranean into North Africa during Ramadan with a visiting team from Argentina. It was a unique opportunity to walk the streets, blessing people and praying for their lives while also encouraging local and foreign workers. They continue to pray that Muslims may differentiate darkness from light as they are led to seek, find, and follow the Messiah through supernatural encounters with Jesus.

Tyler and Bailey Dodds: Tyler said that the Dodds were led and provided beyond what they expected during the last two months that they were living in Hungary. God continues to affirm their call to itinerate ministry to go and worship with global workers and "see" them in the field. They pray that the truths they sang and the moments they enjoyed together would continue to spur their friends to "keep going" in their efforts to spread the gospel worldwide.

Mike and Megan Elkins: Mike is currently serving as an advisor to the board of elders at the local Ugandan church, and he teaches them leadership principles, some from *Feet to My Faith*. As a whole, the Ugandan church is expected to be the largest growing church in the next 40 years. Mike believes "they are in the right place at the right time" as people from Sudan and Congo are arriving in their area from three different warzones.

Tim and Tawnya Green: The Greens recently moved to Fort Worth (HEB area) as volunteers to establish a children's ministry for City Life Church, and they are still open to God's work with Sudanese refugees in Egypt. Tim and Tawnya will join Stonegate at For the Nations in Dallas during the second week of April.

Oleksii and Ivana Ivanov (Ukrainians in Poland): Oleksii continues to pray for creative ways to share the gospel through local relationships. The Ivanovs are currently in conversation with Greater Europe Mission representatives as they explore cooperation with this sending agency. They are excited for the basketball camp in August.

Jonathan and Kristen Lazarini: Laz reported that the Lazarinis and their local Myanmar partners were safe in Chiang Rai after the 7.7 magnitude earthquake that devastated Southeast Asia. They are praying for those who were impacted and for "softened hearts through these hard times."

John and Sharon Mansour: Due to a managerial transition, John has resumed the managerial duties at the Commercial Café on the Harpenden premises which is used to disciple young staff and young people in the community. He enjoys the managerial role and decision making that allows the business to generate revenue for missions, but it adds a complexity to "juggling his other leadership roles."

Hannah Paykin: Hannah said she is currently in a time of good rest during spring break at Black Forest Academy. She prays for creativity as she plans new curriculum for new class units after the break.

Bruno and Suellen Siqueira: Bruno will spend 20 days in McNeal, Arizona at the Ethnos360 headquarters for program manager meetings. A new missionary aviation family is currently learning Portuguese in Brazil before joining their team.

Cheyenne and Priscilla Solis: The Solises reported their family's safety after the Myanmar earthquake. They have increased in-person language learning to a daily frequency. They started a small group of young expat families which has been an encouragement to them.

Berney and Kari Tower: Berney reported increased curiosity and spirituality with local Muslims during Ramadan which has led to more gospel sharing opportunities through in-person interaction and digital engagement. He's encouraged by Stonegate's response to pray, and he believes that God is still at work at "answering prayer on the back end" in the hearts of Muslims during the weeks after this past month of fasting.

Maki and Sunhee Umakoshi (Japanese in Detroit): Maki and Sunhee continue to experience the difficulty of laboring among the most unreached Japanese people, but they also celebrate small but profound instances of heart transformation, church growth, and public professions of faith through baptism. The local community of Japanese expats now associate the Japanese festival outreaches with Hikari City Church. They are praying for travel visas to visit family in Japan.
